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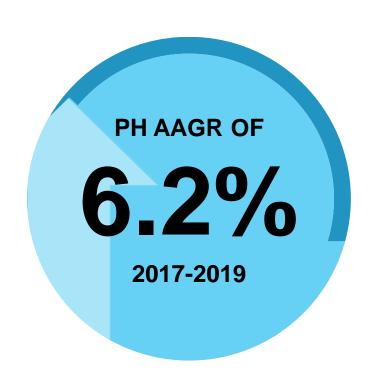

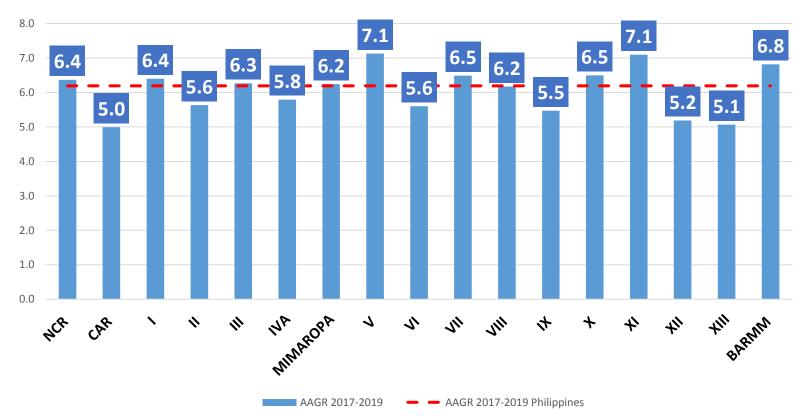

GRDP Average Annual Growth Rate (AAGR) 2017 – 2019, at constant 2018 prices

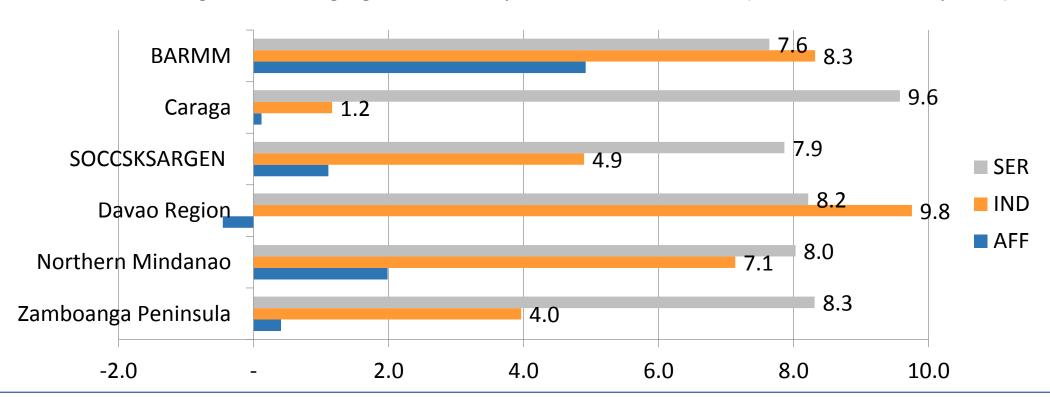




Economic Performance

Mindanao regions' average growth rates per sector, 2017-2019 (at constant 2018 prices)



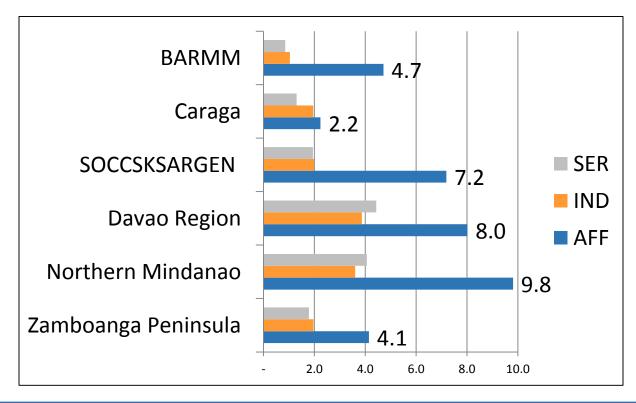


Economic Performance

Mindanao is predominantly agriculture-based

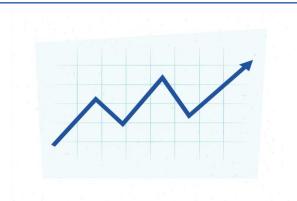
Mindanao regions' average share in the country's total output per sector, 2017-2019 (at constant 2018 prices)





Pandemic's Impact to the Economy

Philippines entered the crisis with strong economic prospects



Strong economic growth performance (6.6% average from 2016-2019)

- GDP growth rate 2017-2018 at 6.3 percent
- GDP growth rate 2018-2019 at 6.0 percent







Low and stable inflation

3 percent average inflation rate from 2016 to 2019, enabled by Rice Tariffication Law

Strong Fiscal Position

Highest revenue (16.1%) and lowest debt (39.6%) as shares of GDP in 2019, enabled by tax reform

Lowest poverty incidence

16.7 percent poverty incidence among population, and 12.1 percent poverty incidence among families as of 2018

With 75 percent of the economy forced to shutdown, unemployment and underemployment increased sharply.

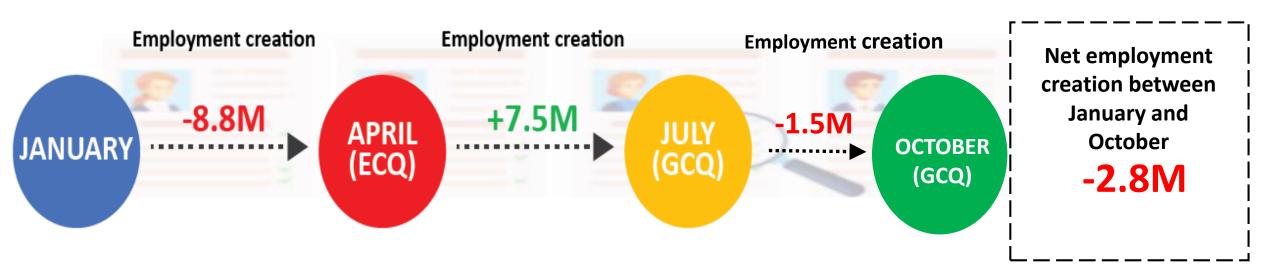

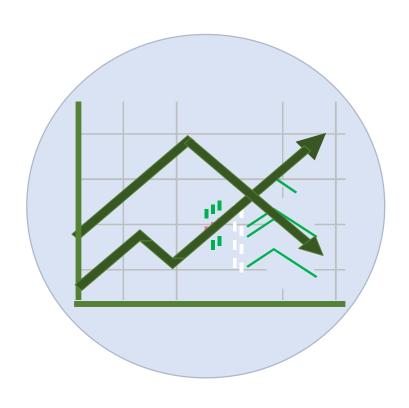
Economic Outlook for 2021

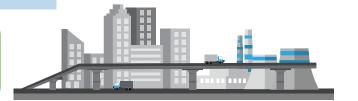
Expected Drivers of Growth

DEMAND



- Household consumption: Improved consumer and investor sentiments as the government boosts the country's health systems capacity along with monetary and fiscal stimulus measures to support the economy
- **Government spending:** Timely passage of the 2021 national budget to implement recovery programs.
- **Investment:** Investment in shovel-ready projects under the Build Build (BBB) program, health-related facilities, and digital infrastructure.
- **Exports:** Recovery of global trade, implementation of the Regional Comprehensive Economic Partnership (RCEP)

SUPPLY



- Industry: The easing of community quarantine restrictions is expected to help the recovery in manufacturing and construction activities with spillover to utilities sector
- Services: E-commerce, increased demand for digital goods and services, warehousing and logistics, resumption of more public transport operations, domestic tourism
- Agriculture: Diversification program towards highvalue crops; infrastructure investment



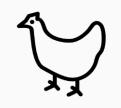

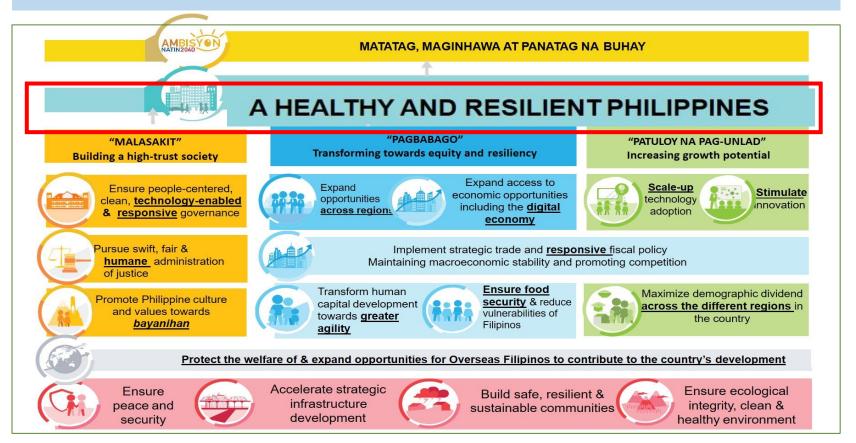

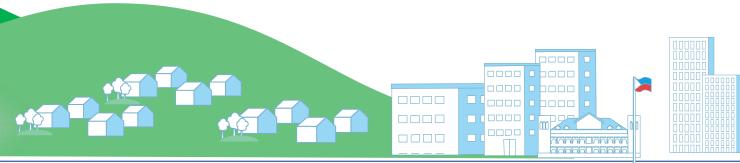
Philippine Development Plan 2017-2022

ZAMBOANGA PENINSULA: Center of Sustainable Agri-Fishery Industries

Zamboanga del Norte: coconut, mango, and cacao

Zamboanga Sibugay: Seaweeds, rubber, calamansi, and abaca

Zamboanga del Sur: Coconut, cassava, organic rice and duck farming

Dipolog City: Processed fish Isabela City: Fish and Other Marine Products, rubber

Zamboanga City: Processed fish and cacao

SOCCSKSARGEN: Agri-industrial Hub and Ecotourism Center

Midsayap-Kidapawan City (MK)
Agri-Industrial and Eco-Tourism
Corridor: Fruit capital, agriprocessing center

Isulan-General Santos (IGS) Agri-Industrial and Eco-Tourism Corridor: Tuna Capital; high value commercial crops, corn and other agri-based products, fishery-based products

Lebak-Maasim- Alabel-Glan (LMAG) Coastal Development Zone: marine fishing, coconut, cement, marble, coffee

Caraga: Fishery, Agroforestry, Mineral and Ecotourism Center

Agusan del Sur: Agro-forestry center and food basket of the region; producers of palay and corn

Agusan del Norte: largest source of processed timber such as lumber and plywood in the region

Surigao del Norte and Surigao del Sur: accounts for 80 percent of the region's fishery output; with the top fishery species produced in the region include seaweed, frigate tuna, Indian sardines, yellow fin tuna and skipjack tuna

BARMM: Potential Halal Hub

Agri-fishery sector mainly focuses on palay, corn, seaweeds, rubber, coffee, goat, abaca, banana, coconut and cassava production

Tawi-Tawi: Seaweeds Capital of

Sulu: Fruit Capital (mangosteen, durian, lanzones), Coffee Capital of BARMM

Davao Region

Davao region is host to an abundant banana industry, with banana remaining as Davao Region's top export commodity.

One of the largest iron deposits in the world

Halal Industry is also being pushed by Zamboanga Peninsula (institutionalization of the Asian Halal Center); by Davao Region (establishment of Regional Halal Committee); SOCCSKSARGEN (completion of the Philippine National Halal Laboratory); and by BARMM (establishment of the Halal ecosystem and barter trading)

Banner Programs to Keep Jobs and Income

Support to keep JOBS and INCOME



To entice companies to produce more **SUPPLY**

- 1. Balik Probinsya Program
- 2. Repurposing of Manufacturing
- 3. Assistance for Tourism, Travel and Transport
- 4. Assistance to the agriculture sector and support the food value chain
- 5. Active labor market facilitation
- 6. Enhanced BBB program

- Boost consumer confidence and demand by:
 - a) COVID-proofing businesses to reduce fear
 - b) Increasing accessibility to markets (online platforms, contactless payments, logistics)
- 2. Fast-track implementation of government infrastructure projects
- 3. Implement strategic stockpiling initiatives with strong linkages to domestic manufacturers

- 1. Food production/food value chain improvement
- 2. Develop PPE Ecosystem
 - Address concerns on ease of doing including delays in regulatory approvals
 - b) Create platform for business matching (raw materials suppliers to end-product manufacturers)
 - c) Attract investors for gaps in supply chain
 - d) Provide testing laboratories
- Launch investment promotion campaign (Make it Happen in the Philippines)
- 4. Digitization of the economy
- 5. Skills re-training and re-tooling program



Working Together Towards Recovery

- Manage risk and open more the economy.
 - Escalation of community quarantine should be last resort
- Enable a whole-of-society response to health pandemic and recovery by enhancing coordination and cooperation among the national government, LGUs, private sector, and civil society organizations; and building public trust and confidence;
- Intensify communication campaign to inform and educate everyone on the health protocols.
